- Abstract words are taught using **associations, synonyms, and body language**.

5. Question-Answer Format

- Teachers frequently ask questions to encourage **spontaneous speech**.
- Questions help students **think in the target language** rather than translate from their native language.

6. Emphasis on Correct Pronunciation

- Phonetics and accurate pronunciation are reinforced through **listening and repetition**.
- The goal is to develop **natural speech patterns** without interference from the native language.

7. Immediate Correction

- Errors are corrected instantly through **modeling and repetition**, ensuring proper language habits.
- However, correction is done in a way that encourages learning rather than discourages participation.

8. Everyday Language Use

- Lessons revolve around **practical and commonly used language**.
- Students engage in real-life conversations to **develop functional fluency**.

Teaching Techniques

To implement the Direct Method, teachers use various interactive techniques, such as:

- Question and Answer Drills – Students respond in full sentences, reinforcing structure and fluency.
- Demonstrations and Real Objects – Visual aids and gestures help convey meaning.
- Dialogue Practice – Students engage in scripted and unscripted conversations.
- Dictation – Listening and writing exercises improve comprehension and accuracy.
- Reading Aloud – Helps with pronunciation and fluency.
- Self-Correction – Encouraging learners to recognize and correct their mistakes.

Advantages and Disadvantages

Advantages:

1. Enhances Speaking Skills – Learners become comfortable using the language actively.
2. Builds Natural Fluency – Mimics first language acquisition processes.
