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Grammar Translation Method (GTM)

1. Introduction

- **Minimal real-life application** Learners may struggle in real-life situations due to the lack of practical speaking exercises.
- **Over-reliance on the native language** Constant translation prevents students from thinking directly in the target language.

While GTM is **less common** in modern language teaching, some aspects are still used in formal education, especially in:

- University-level language programs (e.g., Latin, Ancient Greek, and literature studies).
- Translation studies where accuracy and grammatical precision are essential.
- Secondary education in non-communicative settings where grammar is a major focus.
